He is young because "He makes all things new" and loves innovation; because He astonishes and loves astonishment; because He dreams and wants us to dream..."


What a wonderful thought.

Reemergence and Renewal

With a staff of 1,200 serving nearly 500,000 individuals each year, Catholic Charities is emerging from the pandemic fortified to witness a message of mercy and hope to a world in need.

The Call to Renewal

During the pandemic, Catholic Charities underwent its **first leadership transition in 25 years**, and with that a movement from clergy to lay leadership. It is an honor and a deep responsibility to be called to undertake this change. Leading Catholic Charities is by far the most meaningful work I have ever undertaken. It is also the most challenging—especially amidst a pandemic. **My thanks to the many, many people who have walked beside me these past two years, as we have brought Charities through this critical period and as we have undertaken God's call to rejuvenation and renewal.**

I am grateful for the steady and courageous leadership of Board Chair **Mike Monticello** and former Chair **Dr. Janice Klich**. Under Janice and Mike's guidance, the Board took the opportunity to simplify and strengthen our fiduciary oversight, moving from a 50-person to an 18-person Board of Directors—allowing us to bring more focus to our work.

It is with great sadness that we share the news of Vice Chair **Emile Johnson**'s recent passing. His wisdom and grace also were pivotal to undertaking this critical change management initiative (*see page 17*).

The Call to Simplicity

In Programs, with Kathy Donahue's retirement in 2021, we welcomed Chief Program Officer, Ami Novoryta, and elevated long-time Charities leader Gina Cleggs to Senior Vice President. Prior to joining us, Ami was Chief Strategy Officer at Heartland Alliance. Ami and Gina spent the first 18 months in their new roles studying all our programs and contracts to determine how we might best serve as we exited the pandemic. There were many insights about redundancies that had developed across our Service Areas and contracts that no longer fit our mission and calling.

• We narrowed our focus by exiting some programs in late 2021 and moving from six Service Areas to four Impact Areas: Immediate Access and Basic Needs; Children, Youth, and Families; Seniors; and Housing.

• The article on pages 8 and 9 tells the story behind the Organize to Thrive initiative, which is part of our ongoing effort to make it easier for our clients and staff to navigate our organization and access the resources they need.

None of this work would have been possible without the extraordinary leadership of long-time Charities' staff member **Elida Hernandez**, who was promoted to Chief Finance and Administrative Officer. Elida has done an outstanding job marshalling us through the pandemic financially, with the wise partnership of our Board Finance Committee chair **Therese Krieger** and Audit Committee chair **Kevin Cleary**.

Elida partners daily with our new Senior Vice President of People and Culture, **Erica O'Malley**, and our new General Counsel, **Maria Simon**. (continued on page 7)

The Call to Community

Community is core to Catholic Charities' mission and culture. In 1917, we were founded in a spirit of increasing impact for those in need by building community around mission.

As we studied how we might serve more effectively, the Board identified the need to revitalize how we build community around mission engagement. Under the thoughtful leadership of former Board Vice Chair

Mark Noetzel, the recommendation was made to transition our Board of Advisors to three partners' groups: Partners in Mission, Partners in Giving, and Partners in Prayer.

Phil is overseeing the renewal of our visual identity, publications, and soon-to-launch new website. All organizations must periodically rethink how they operate and serve. Within Catholic Charities, the challenges exposed by the pandemic, along with the strengths we leveraged to overcome them, turned out to be a wonderful starting point for us to reflect on who we are and what we are called to do.

Starting in Spring 2021, our team engaged in an 18-month period of rigorous learning, listening, and visioning. Our goals: optimize the organization of Catholic Charities programs and services to deepen impact on peoples' lives, increase access to and referrals among teams, and become the most trusted partner for mission-driven organizations in the Midwest.

Catholic Charities has always had a strong entrepreneurial culture, which established and grew programs and teams to serve our communities in wonderful ways. However, what flourished in one region, sometimes did not in another. When we analyzed not just who our clients are, but where we serve them, we saw we were missing opportunities to maximize efficiencies and share best practices across programs, and in some cases, we had erected unintended barriers that were preventing our clients from receiving all the help we could provide.

As a clearer picture of our operations emerged, we began to conceive a simpler way for Catholic Charities to organize and deliver its programs and services. To start, we mapped the Catholic Charities ecosystem and considered it within the larger socioeconomic landscape of our region. Knowing there was profound need across Cook and Lake counties, we wanted to figure out how we can serve more deeply. We conducted an organization-wide survey of employees; held focus groups and one-on-one conversations with frontline staff; and reviewed facility usage, funding trends, and internal systems infrastructure.

Simplifying How We Serve

Taking into account everything we learned, we worked with our leaders and teams across Catholic Charities to conceive and transition to a more streamlined structure that we believe will make it easier for our staff to accompany those we serve. Our work is now organized around four Impact Areas, through which we offer nearly 40 programs at more than 80 locations. The graphic on the left summarizes our new structure.



Our aspiration:

To become the most trusted partner for mission-driven people and organizations in the Midwest

As we organize to ensure our clients will continue to thrive, we are also building out three functional areas that will serve as connective tissue across Catholic Charities and enable us to deepen our impact. Through the Charities Hub and regional welcoming centers, we will meet clients where they are and streamline their process for accessing critical services and supports. In our Client and Community Impact area, we will continue our commitment to continuous program improvement, learning that is rooted in data and impact, and building a community of support for teams to engage more successfully.

Moving forward, we will be empowering and equipping our leaders and teams with additional professional development and coaching. Our amazing staff is at the heart of our success at Charities. We are stronger when we invest in amplifying their impact.

Localizing Our Touch through Regional Mission Boards

Our new model for Regional Mission Boards was informed by contributions from leaders throughout Cook and Lake counties and serves as an excellent framework for increasing our outreach efforts at local level.

Throughout its history, Catholic Charities' strength has come from our community of partners coming together committed to collaboration and service. With Partners in Mission (see page 11), anyone who wants to be involved in service to our clients on the local, parish, or regional level can choose from a wide range of volunteer opportunities available at "hubs" in the six vicariates that contain all parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago.

In addition, strengthening and empowering our local Mission Boards will offer more opportunities for people to support and serve while connecting more clients in need to our programs and services, locally in their community. While our new Regional Mission Board structure will be consistent across all regions, its design provides flexibility for each region to respond to the needs and engagement opportunities within its local communities, including the ongoing operation of current volunteer activities.


What Makes up a Regional Mission Board



Growing Wealth Inequality in Our Country

The Majority of All Wealth in the U.S. is Controlled by the Top 10%

Percent of Total U.S. Wealth Earned by Each Wealth Group, Q1 1990-Q1 2022



When you think about just \$500 a week to support a family of four, it's harrowing, but hard to grasp.

Income only tells one part of the picture. Wealth is another component.

The bottom 90% of American households combined control less wealth than the top 1%.

And, since 1990, the amount of wealth controlled by the top 1% of Americans has grown from 23% to 32%. In that same timeframe, the amount controlled by the bottom 90% has decreased from nearly 40% to 30%.

The Face of Poverty in Our Region

Wealth inequality widened dramatically in the decade preceding the pandemic; all research suggests it's grown even worse. 50% or more of the 6 million people living in Cook

and Lake counties have little or no savings—they are a paycheck away from zero. Yes, there are jobs, but rapid inflation and the rising cost of gas, childcare, and elder care make it

prohibitively expensive for many to work. The numbers below support what we know from our work walking alongside the individuals and families we serve.

What Does it Mean to Live Below the Federal Poverty Line in 2022?

The U.S. government defines the Federal Poverty Line (FPL) by annual household income. While this number is adjusted annually for inflation, it is widely considered inadequate and outdated. Households typically qualify as "low income" at 200% of the FPL.

To determine eligibility for certain social services, the U.S. government defines the Federal Poverty Line by annual household income. This number is adjusted annually for inflation.

\$13,500 for 1 person (\$260/week)

\$27,750 for a family of 4 (\$533/week)



Nearly **1 in 8** people in Cook and Lake counties is living below the poverty line, or **676,000 of our neighbors.** In Chicago's Austin neighborhood, that number rises to almost **1 out of 3**.


Wider Disparity for Communities of Color

Income and wealth are also tied to other issues, like food insecurity. In the Chicago metro region, 19% of all people faced food insecurity in 2020. That number is higher in Latinx and Black communities. Just behind food insecurity is shelter; nearly 1 in 3 Illinois renters are not

In some suburbs north of Chicago, the median net worth approaches \$1 million. Just a few miles away, in the city center (which includes the Loop, Gold Coast, and South Loop), the median net worth for households is close to \$160,000. In Austin on the city's west side, this figure is \$26,000; just to the south in West Garfield Park it's \$4,400.

Addressing Behavioral Health

Over the past two years, Catholic Charities has grown and strengthened our diverse behavioral health services for adults and children, pivoting to telehealth during the pandemic to support existing and new clients, and expanding to address a pressing need for trauma-informed counseling and case management for youth and families impacted by community violence. Promoting mental well-being is integral to all our programs.

Deepening Access to Mental Wellness on the West Side

To help solve Chicago's growing mental health crisis, residents of the West Side mobilized to create the Encompassing Center. After the community worked to get a referendum passed mandating tax revenue to expand mental health services in the Near West Side communities, Catholic Charities was chosen to provide case management, mental health, and substance use services at the center. In only two and a half years, the Center has reached more than 600 clients with counseling and case management, all of whom are residents of the West Side. In one year, it doubled the number of clients served due to expanded outreach and its growing recognition as a trusted provider. By providing the community with a safe space for healing and connection, the Center is helping to address systemic inequalities and deliver counseling services with care, respect, and excellence.

House of the Good Shepherd opened one of the first domestic violence shelter/programs in Chicago in 1980. Since then, it has helped more than 6,000 vulnerable women and children leave behind the cycle of violent homes, step out of poverty, and embrace a future full of hope and independence.

Extending Our Reach to Survivors in Need

Catholic Charities' Domestic Violence Counseling program serves as a haven of support for survivors of domestic violence, particularly during the pandemic when incidents of abuse were alarmingly high. In FY22, program referrals increased by 75 percent, a reflection of not just significant need, but also our dynamic partnership network and the trainings we offer to other providers and parishes that help ensure survivors receive support with diligence and expediency. We also opened a counseling and outreach program in Chicago's Austin community, helping to meet local needs for women and their children.

Scaling a Model of Support for Survivors of Suicide Loss

During its 43 years of operation, Loving Outreach for Survivors of Suicide (LOSS) has developed a specialized and comprehensive program model that addresses the unique needs of survivors of suicide loss, compassionately accompanying them on their grief journey. In addition to touching the lives of those in the Chicago region, LOSS is often consulted by national and international organizations as they seek to create their own support services for survivors of suicide loss. In fact, online platforms that grew out of necessity during the pandemic have enabled LOSS to serve clients throughout the US and overseas. Today, support groups and speaker presentations can be accessed anywhere via telehealth platforms and the LOSS YouTube channel. More than 500 people have participated in our online support groups, and 1,500 people have attended our Grief Speaker Series since April 2020.

Building Community with Seniors

From a shared midday meal to a wide variety of activities and events, the Josephine P. Argento Senior Center, one of 12 Catholic Charities senior centers and located within our Bernardin Manor senior housing residence in Calumet City, always has something fun going on to keep seniors active and engaged.

Recently, the Center had the honor of being chosen by the National Council on Aging (NCOA) to participate in its study on the growing importance of senior centers nationwide.

It was exciting for Argento Center participants to let NCOA know how vital the Center is to their physical and mental health. Magnolia Chandler, a 10-year Bernardin Manor resident

and Center participant, says, "Every day I thank God that I get to wake up in my beautiful apartment and come here to the Center to be with my friends for fun and fellowship. Sometimes seniors don't have as much to do, but there is something here for us every day to keep us active and healthy."

Magnolia attributes the success of the Argento Center to its dynamic director, Robert Boyd, a former cruise director who has led the Center since 2012. "Rob is wonderful. There is nothing he won't do for us. He is just a real, real blessing—so respectful and kind to all of us. I feel like he is one of my sons."

Rob, on the other hand, attributes the success of the Center to the residents. "I just do what they tell me to do,"

he laughs. "All the members of the Senior Council come up with the ideas for the parties, events, activities, food... I am grateful to them for making my job easier! And they help whenever needed. I know I can count on Magnolia and the other residents to make our activities a success."

Magnolia and Rob are grateful for each other, and for Catholic Charities. "I don't know what I would do without the Center and my home in Bernardin Manor," Magnolia says. "I am grateful to Catholic Charities for all of it, everything." Rob adds, "I am eternally grateful to Catholic Charities for giving me the opportunity to serve the seniors here. They bring joy to my life and make me smile every day!"

Ascension-St. Edmund Parish

Catholic Charities' parish partnerships have always been instrumental to our efforts to meet growing needs throughout the Archdiocese. But over the past two and a half years, these partnerships have become even more important.

During the pandemic, many Catholic Charities food pantries and emergency assistance sites saw double and triple the number of people needing assistance. In recent months the organization has seen another surge in need as the working poor struggle with rising food and gas prices. Mike Waters, Regional Director of Catholic Charities West-Cook Region, says "Our food, pantry traffic was up more

than 50 percent from June 2020 to June 2021 and we are on pace to feed 25,000 people through our Cicero pantry this year."

Ascension-St. Edmund Parish* in Oak Park has been critical to helping Catholic Charities meet this increased demand. Each week it provides a large donation of fresh fruits and vegetables—this is on top of the fresh produce Catholic Charities is able to grow itself thanks to the parish's Knights of Columbus, who helped clear land and build the garden beds at Cicero office. The garden is now able to produce about 200 pounds of fresh produce each year.



Another blessing is that the Knights organize a weekly diaper drive at the parish, which last year provided a whopping 17,455 diapers and 462 boxes of wipes to food pantry clients. "The importance of the diapers cannot be overstated," says Mike. "Every diaper that a family does not have to buy means that money can go toward rent, gas, or medicine. And it is just as important for our seniors who use adult diapers."

The parish also organizes an annual fall coat drive and regularly helps with Catholic Charities' Evening Supper Program.

"We like partnering with Catholic Charities because they do wonderful, amazing work for the poor and marginalized," says Rev. Rex Pillai, who was recently named Ppastor of the unified Ascension-St. Edmund Parish.

Fr. Rex explains that service is a part of the parish culture. "Our parishioners want to share what they have received with others. This is just something we do as Catholics and as disciples of Christ. It is nice to see because it is exactly the kind of compassion and kindness we need in today's culture."

Ascension-St. Edmund Parish truly embodies the Catholic Church's mission of charity. Catholic Charities is grateful to partner with them to witness a message of mercy and hope to a world in need.

Honoring Our Cherished Partners



Emile Johnson (1955-2022)

It is hard to put into words what Emile Johnson means to Catholic Charities, and to the thousands of people he has had a positive impact on with his warmth, smile, kindness, and contagious passion for service.

Emile, Vice Chair of the Board of Directors, passed away on July 21 at the age of 67 after a brief illness. His life was full of devotion to his family, community, and Catholic Charities.

Emile first became involved with Catholic Charities as an executive with a global healthcare company that supplied our 16 Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Centers. Later, having started his own canned foods business, Goode Foods, he continued to offer extraordinary support to our WIC Centers and shared his joy for educating the public about the importance of good nutrition and healthy eating.

Emile was elected to Catholic Charities Board of Advisors in 2013 and to the Board of Directors in 2018, serving on many committees including: Benefits; Development; 100th Anniversary; Golf Invitational; and the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Task Force. He was a member of the Presidential Selection Committee involved in the search for the new President of Catholic Charities in 2019. As Vice Chair of the current Board of Directors, Emile served on the Executive Committee.

Emile often spoke passionately about his lifelong commitment to giving back, in service to God, including a conversation years ago with Cardinal Bernardin, who asked him to become more involved with Catholic Charities. In response to this request, Emile recalled saying, "As I consider this, I will ask for you to pray for me.

I always ask clerics to pray for me! And those prayers brought me here to you."
